



999 Day is held on 9th September each year and formally begins at 9am (the 9th hour of the 9th day of the 9th month). It is your opportunity to show your support for our NHS and 999 heroes.

999 Day is supported by HM The Queen; HRH The Prince of Wales; HRH The Duke of Cambridge; the Prime Minister; the First Ministers of Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales; and all emergency services.

2 million people work and volunteer across the NHS and emergency services, including 250,000 first responders.



999 Day aims:

- 999 Day is an opportunity for blue light services to engage with the communities they serve.
- Opportunity for 999 charities to fundraise, raise their profile, and generate support.
- Promotes the many different careers and volunteer roles available within the NHS and 999 services.
- Promotes using the emergency services responsibly.
- Educates the public on essential skills including how to be safe in the water, fire safety, crime prevention, and essential life-saving skills.
